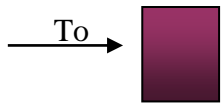
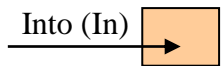


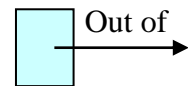
## Prepositions

- A lot of English words come **from** Latin.

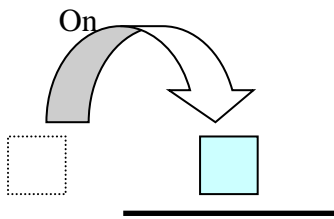


- We like to jump **into** the water.
- A man came **out of** the house and got **into** a car.
- Why are you looking **out of** the window?
- “Take the old batteries **out of** the radio.

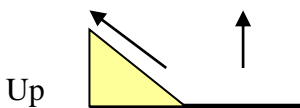
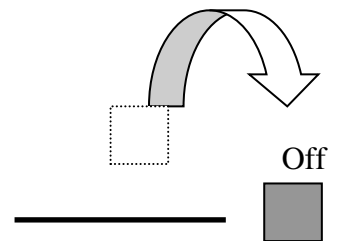


We say **put** something **in** ... (*not usually 'into'*)

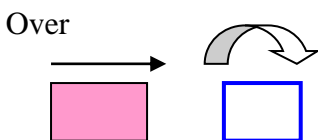
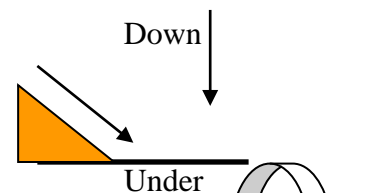
- I **put** the new batteries **in** the radio.



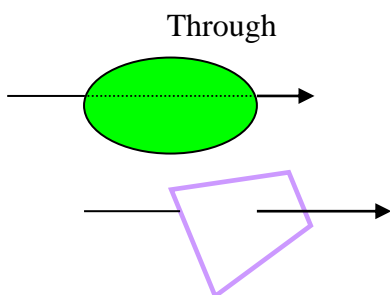
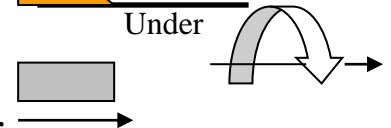
- Don't put your feet **on** the table.
- Please take your feet **off** the table.
- I'm going to hang some pictures **on** the wall.
- Be careful! Don't fall **off** your bicycle.
- We get **on** the bus in Princes Street after work.



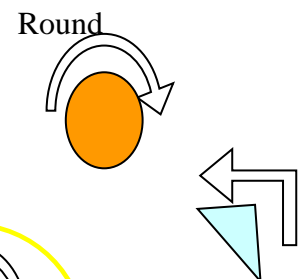
- We walked **up** the hill to the house.
- Be careful! Don't fall **down** the stairs.



- The plane flies **over** the mountains.
- I need to jump **over** the wall to get the ball.
- Some people say it is unlucky to walk **under** a ladder.

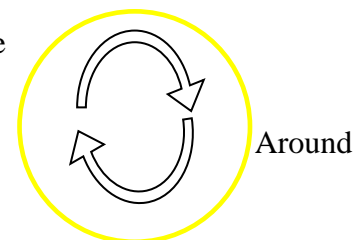


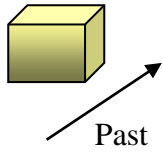
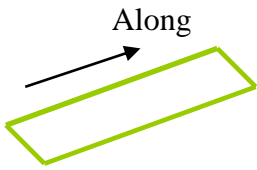
- A bird flies into the room **through** the window
- The old road goes **through** the village.
- The new road goes **round** the village.
- The bus stop is just **round** the corner.
- I walk **round** the town and to take some photographs.



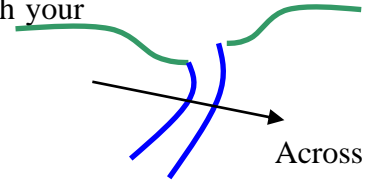
You can also use **around** (= round):

- We walk **around** the town.





- Why are you walking **along** the road with your dog?
- Let's go for a walk **along** the river.
- Dogs swim **across** the river every day.



- They always walk **past** me without speaking.
- A: Excuse me, how do I get to the hospital?  
B: Go along this road, **past** the cinema, under the bridge and the hospital is on the left.
